SETTING THE SCENE - WHY IS GENDER AN ISSUE IN ACCESS TO HEALTH IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES?

Women and girls in underserved communities face multiple structural barriers to health care, including poverty, conflict, displacement, restrictive social norms, lack of infrastructure, limited access to quality medicines, gaps in prevention services such as vaccines and cancer screening, and insufficient sexual and reproductive health education.

Addressing neglected women's health needs is one of the most impactful investments in global health. It can have lasting benefits for families, communities, and economies. Yet women in low- and middle-income countries continue to face severe inequities in accessing health care, resulting in poor health outcomes, preventable deaths and disabilities, and significant economic consequences.

GENDER AND HEALTH: HOW GENDER SHAPES HEALTH RISKS, OUTCOMES AND EQUITY

This panel will examine how the social, economic and cultural realities of gender and gender norms shape the health and well-being of women and girls, in both the developing and developed world.

ADOLESCENT GIRLS' ACCESS TO HEALTH AND THRIVING ADULT LIFE

The transition from girl to woman is a defining moment in every culture. For girls in underserved communities, it is also a moment of profound vulnerability, shaped by social norms that silence, structures that exclude, and barriers that prevent awareness. This panel, organised with CARE France, examines what prevents every adolescent girls' right to knowledge and access and spotlights successful solutions.

The discussion on the theme of "adolescent girls' health," will start with the screening of a short video (3 minutes) featuring the testimony of a young beneficiary of the Kilonga project in Madagascar, implemented by CARE. The video addresses taboos around menstruation, their impact on health, access to menstrual products, and the links between shifting social norms, improved health outcomes, and academic success.
